My dear aunt Marie,

As to the money of which you wrote that is coming to us I would like to make a proposition which I think will save a great deal of time, trouble and expense. The plan is this that I give up my own share of the money that would come to me and take instead some family heirloom that had belonged to my grandparents. Perhaps some old silver ware or jewelry that had been used by my grandparents. I would prize any thing that had been used by them as in sacred memory of them and would expect to hand them down to my childrens' children [...]
