 Iuxuria (lechery/lust) is an intense desire. Lust could involve the intense desire of money, food, fame, power or sex. 	
 gula (gluttony) is the over-indulgence and over- consumption of anything to the point of waste. Basically, it is selfishness, placing concern with one's own interests above the well-being or inter- ests of others. 	
3. <i>avaritia</i> (avarice / greed) is an excessive desire of material possessions. It means hoarding of materials or objects, theft and robbery, especially by means of violence, trickery, or manipulation of authority.	
 acedia (sloth/discouragement) is sometimes de- fined as physical laziness and spiritual laziness is emphasized. Failing to develop spiritually is key to becoming guilty of sloth. 	
5. <i>ira</i> (wrath) means inordinate and uncontrolled feelings of hatred and anger. It can be expressed as impatience, revenge, violence and self-destructive behaviour, such as drug abuse or suicide.	
 invidia (envy) is an insatiable desire and similar to jealousy in that they both feel discontent to- wards someone's traits, status, abilities, or re- wards. 	
7. <i>superbia</i> (pride) is considered the most serious and the source of the other deadly sins. It means excessive admiration of oneself and believing that one is essentially better than others, failing to ac- knowledge the accomplishments of others.
